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Making a difference - Greening Career Development

The CDA National Career Conference in Adelaide, 7-9 April 2010 is not an environmental conference but a career development conference with a conscience. The 19th annual conference for the Career Development Association of Australia focuses on how career practitioners could be making a difference to the world they live in as well as the world future generations will experience. Keynotes and guest speakers will provide insights into current career development theory and practices and workshop presentations will explore processes and strategies but they will relate these to the environment in which they will be applied. This conference will enable delegates to develop new skills and consider new insights as well as refine existing knowledge and hone existing skills. The theme 'greening career development' was chosen to illustrate that it is possible to promote sustainability, environmental consciousness and the triple bottom line both individually within your own practice and also in the scope of your work with clients.

The term green jobs is being used increasingly in describing existing jobs in sectors such as renewable energy, buildings and construction, transportation, agriculture and forestry and it is expected that larger numbers of green jobs across more sectors of the economy will be created and the pace of this creation will increase. There will be changes in jobs as resource use changes and some jobs may disappear without replacement, and many existing jobs will be transformed as tools, processes and the products and services change.
